A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Students of the Cloverdale Learning Centre:

As hard as it is to believe, December is almost upon us and time has definitely flown by so far this year. As always, we have had a busy start to the school year with lots going on.

It was wonderful to begin the year with almost no changes to our staff this year. A familiar face rejoined us and we welcomed Robert back as an EA to help out with our math students. It was certainly a busy start in September and early October as almost 40 new students started at CLC, one of our highest number of intakes in recent years!

This year, we are continuing with our school focus on improving student attendance, progress and building positive relationships. During two professional days over the summer, staff worked hard to develop plans to adjust our orientation process for new students and to bring in purposeful discussions and activities about growth mindsets in classes. The orientation process is meant to make students feel more comfortable and enable them to socialize with other students and staff at CLC.

Students and staff have participated in some amazing activities since the beginning of the school year including:

- Staff attending a professional day presentation by Shenny Nanji (one of our district helping teachers) who provided great ideas for incorporating Social Emotional Learning into teachers' assessment practices. We also had a presentation from Carolyn Sousa, a Aboriginal Department helping teacher, about incorporating Indigenous Principals of Learning in our classes
- Student and staff participated in the annual Orange Shirt Day and Terry Fox Run
- Students had an opportunity to attend a field trip to the Seymour Watershed again this year
- Students and staff also took part in a Remembrance Day assembly to pay respect to the veterans and armed forces personnel for their sacrifices in keeping our country safe

We are also continuing with initiatives introduced last year to support students and their learning:

- Partnership with Cobs Breads, who donates breads and other baked goods for CLC students
- The Path to Graduation Program with the goal of students completing a total of 400 courses this school year
- Monthly prize draws for students completing courses during that month
- Student reflection and self-assessment of core competencies

Our PAC had their first meeting of the year on October 15 and we had some new members joining us. We are pleased that Tania Wong has agreed to continue as chairperson and we welcome new members Leanne Cassap and Monica Wright. Our next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday Feb 12 at 7 PM and I would like to welcome you to join us for that meeting.

As we head toward Winter Break, report cards were published to the parent portal and parent teacher interviews were held on Nov 21. The next important event is our annual Christmas meal. This year, the staff have decided to try something different and we will be inviting <u>all</u> students (morning and afternoon classes) to join us for breakfast on Thursday Dec 19 at 9:00 AM. This will be followed by some fun activities and all students will be dismissed at 12 noon.

Looking ahead, our last day of classes before Winter Break will be on Thursday Dec 19 and school will reopen on Monday January 6. I want to thank all parents and guardians for their continued support to ensure the success for your children's education at CLC.

Dear Parents and Guardians:

Re: Community Youth Activities "Grad Pranks"

We share the pride of accomplishment and look forward to joining you in congratulating the class of 2020. However, in past years there have been troubling incidents of unsafe behaviour and acts of vandalism involving youth in our neighbourhoods participating in reckless events, often characterized as grad activities. Such events are a trend, not just in our school district but in other communities as well. We are asking for your help in ensuring your son or daughter is aware that unsafe and unacceptable behaviours can have serious consequences.

It is important that we work together to ensure that our young people do not take part in, condone, provoke, encourage, or support:

- bullying, cyberbullying, harassment, threat(s) or intimidation
- violence of any form
- verbal, physical or sexual abuse
- discrimination in any form
- theft
- unsafe or dangerous activities
- vandalism
- possession or use of intoxicating or banned substances
- possession or use of weapons (or replica weapons) and explosives

Youth involved in these types of activities may face criminal and school consequences, including losing the privilege to attend extra-curricular events such as the grad ceremony and banquet. Students may also face suspension from school and/or criminal charges. Given that positive citizenship is often considered in selection for school and district scholarships, poor decisions can also impact those award possibilities. Parents are also financially responsible for damage caused by their children – please see the attached School Act excerpt. We ask that you understand the school's and district's position in taking the necessary disciplinary steps in circumstances where inappropriate behaviour occurs.

We also fully support your decision to not permit your son or daughter to attend unsupervised

events. We often hear about camping trips, parties or trips to vacation spots like Whistler which are not organized by the district, parents or the school. Our shared goal of safety for all of our young people is compromised when these events occur. Please contact the school administration if you are uncertain about the status of an event. We would be happy to clarify if this is an event supported by the school or the district. Each year in B.C. there are tragic events associated with "grad activities" that could be avoided through increased awareness and clear expectations.

Defibrillators being installed at all Surrey secondary schools

Surrey Schools will be installing -

lators (AEDs) at all secondary schools, plus four other district sites, in the coming weeks.

The Surrey Board of Education approved installation of the AEDs in the spring of 2019.

worked to develop a detailed implementation plan.

AEDs are portable devices that are applied to a person's chest to treat sudden cardiovascular arrest, caused when the heart's electrical impulses become abnormal and life threatening. AEDs are used to deliver an electric shock that can restore normal rhythm to a heart.

In addition to having the devices at all 20 Surrey secondary schools, the district will install one each at the Bell Performing Arts Centre, the District Education Centre (DEC), the District Facilities Centre and the Resource & Education Centre (REC).



"While not required by legislation, the Surrey Board of Education wanted to take a proactive approach on AEDs," explained Surrey Board of Education chairperson Laurie Larsen. "We made our decision to install these devices in the spring of this year. The motion was quickly passed as the safety of everyone in our buildings is our top priority. These devices need to be accessible when they are needed." Installation of cabinets to house the AED devices began

and orientation is scheduled to start next week. The AEDs will be placed at each site on the day training is completed. It is expected that by the end of November ondary schools in the Surrey School District will be trained

on the appropriate use of the devices and each school will be

The total cost for purchase and installation in all 24 sites was just over \$50,000.

Surrey Schools and Classroom Champions are connecting thousands of elementary school students with world-class athletes thanks to a new partnership with Shaw Communications.

Feedback sought on catchment boundaries for new schools

As the walls are coming up at new elementary schools in South Surrey and Clayton, the process of establishing new catchment boundaries has begun – and we want students and parents to have a say.

In South Surrey, Site 180 (17325 2 Ave.) and Site 206 (16666 23 Ave.) are scheduled to open in 2021 and will have space for 1,177 students, easing overcrowding at nearby elementary schools. In Clayton, Maddaugh Road (19405 76 Ave.) is scheduled to open in September 2021 while Regent Road (18711 74 Ave.) has been through the design process, and once it goes through the tender process, an anticipated opening date will be announced.

The goal in developing new catchment boundaries is to ensure student numbers are balanced between nearby elementary schools. In Clayton, these include Clayton, Hazelgrove and Katzie elementary schools. In South Surrey, these include East Kensington, Hall's Prairie, Morgan, Pacific Heights, Rosemary Heights and Sunnyside elementary schools.

The district has created three options for the Clayton consultation and five options for the South Surrey consultation. All options aim to finding that balance, while also taking into consideration future residential growth and Choice Program locations.

These consultations will be an opportunity to define the culture and character of new school communities. Parent and student input are an important part of this process.
