

British Columbia's Curriculum A Word from the Ministry of Education

Today we live in a state of constant change. It is a technology-rich world, where communication is instant and information is immediately accessible. The way we interact with each other personally, socially, and at work has changed forever. Knowledge is growing and information is changing extremely quickly, creating new possibilities. This is the world our students are entering.

British Columbia's curriculum has been modernized to respond to this demanding world. The Ministry of Education consulted with education experts both locally and internationally. They agreed that to prepare students for the future, the curriculum must be student-centred and flexible, and maintain a focus on literacy and numeracy, while supporting deeper learning.



What and how we teach our students has been designed to provide greater flexibility for teachers, while allowing space and time for students to develop their skills and explore their passions and interests. The deep understanding and application of knowledge is now at the centre of British Columbia's model, as opposed to the memory and recall of facts that previously shaped education around the globe for many decades.

British Columbia's curriculum maintains a focus on sound foundations of literacy and numeracy.

Every student will continue to be connected to the basics of reading, writing and math. These critical skills remain as the foundation of B.C.'s education system, and are a key component of developing an educated citizen.

School-Based Services

Counselling

The Earl Marriott Counselling Department provides personal service for students and is a resource for teachers and families. Counsellors act as advocates for students and their families. Seeing a counsellor is simple: make an appointment online at ems.counsellorappointments.com.

Referrals

English Language Learners

The ELL Program at Earl Marriott Secondary may involve direct English language instruction and/or in-class support. Whenever possible, ELL teachers and regular classroom teachers work together to provide the students with the best possible opportunities for learning and success. All ELL students are integrated into regular classes.

Learner Support Team

The learner support team works with classroom teachers to assist students with learning difficulties. LST is a non-enrolling program at Earl Marriott where students with identified learning difficulties are offered support in classrooms. Students can also receive support in the LST Learning Centre when our teaching staff and LST support staff feel it is needed. The LST offers a range of services that includes review and remediation of basic skills, assistance in improving study skills, direct instruction in adaptive technology and one-to-one teaching to help the student understand difficult concepts.

Library and Learning Commons

The school library is open for much of the school day. Materials range from conventional print sources to video resources which provide assistance for student research, as well as reading pleasure. The teacher librarian is there to help with the research process and is able to make suggestions for recreational reading. The library has a library homepage linked via www.earlmarriott.com. It is constantly updated with links to enhance research in various subject areas as well as links to the Ministry of Education.

Youth Care Worker

School Based Youth Care Workers provide support for students in regular classroom settings who might be at risk for suspensions or referral for a special program. They may also provide support for students referred to or in transition from alternate programs.

District-Based Services

There are a number of specialty programs offered in the Surrey School District. A description of the major speciality programs available in the Surrey School District is listed below. To find out more about the program options, including admission requirements, contact the counselling department or administration at Earl Marriott Secondary.

Adolescent Day Treatment Program

This is a short-term program for psychiatrically fragile adolescents (ages 13-18) and is in a non-school setting. Referrals are through a committee with representatives from the Ministries of Education, Health, and Children and Families. The program provides individual instruction in a small classroom setting with limited enrolment.

District Resource Counsellors

- Consult with counsellors, administrators and school-based teams regarding at-risk students.
- Consult, negotiate and coordinate with students, parents, and district and school personnel regarding
 the placement of students who are suspended over five days.
- Participate in or represent our school district on specific community committees.
- Act as an advocate for students and families.
- Act as a resource for school-based crisis response teams.
- Liaise with conjoint Ministry programs.

Growing Together

This is a program for pregnant and parenting teens which is offered by the district. Contact school counsellor for more information.

Hearing and Vision Services

Teachers of the Deaf or Hard of Hearing provide itinerant services to students who are deaf or hard of hearing. The form and level of support is dictated by the intensity of need as outlined in the students Individual Education Plan (IEP). Goals pertain to audiology, academic achievement, social/emotional development, listening, communication, speech reading, self-advocacy, appreciation of deaf culture, etc. In addition, TDHHs facilitate networking between students and their families and community based personnel, and also creates opportunities through which students can interact with peers who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Hospital Homebound Teacher Service

This service provides direct instruction to students who are unable to attend school due to a non-contagious medical situation. Once a doctor's certificate has been obtained, the Hospital/Homebound Service can be accessed via school counsellors or directly at 604-590-2255.

International Baccalaureate Program

The International Baccalaureate Program is a two-year diploma program designed by scholars from the international academic community for the intellectually-talented and academically-motivated high school student. The prescribed process of learning and reflecting on major academic disciplines leads to external examinations administered by the IB offices in Geneva and London. The IB Diploma is accepted worldwide

for university entrance. The IB process also requires participation in an aesthetic activity (art, music, drama), sports and regular volunteer service to the community. The IB goal is to educate an international community of skilled, thoughtful, compassionate, and responsible citizens: citizens whose commitment to their fellow peers and to their communities transcends national, cultural, and social barriers. IB students zest for learning continues throughout their lives. The International Baccalaureate Program is a district program offered at Semiahmoo Secondary School. Please consult Semiahmoo Secondary School for course descriptions.

Integrated Academic Program (Inter-A)

Inter-A is a cross-graded (grades 7-12), continuous program that features peer tutors and cooperative group skills located at Queen Elizabeth Secondary. Students are guided to use cooperation, inquiry, organization and reasoning skills to conduct research in a variety of discipline areas (Fine Arts, Sciences, Humanities, Cooperative Education, Business Education) using an integrated approach. Students are able to complete senior coursework with emphasis on work experience and cooperative education.

Multicultural Workers

Multicultural workers have extensive experience in dealing with cross-cultural issues and are able to respond sensitively to the academic needs of ELL students.

School Resource Officers (SRO)

The school liaison team consists of R.C.M.P. officers who provide educational programs to elementary schools and problem-solving support for secondary students. Officers' duties include some enforcement and participation in special projects.

School Psychologists

School Psychologists provide district-based, non-categorical educational assessment services designed to support students, school personnel, and parents in enhancing academic, adaptive, and social skills for students.

Speech/Language Pathologists

A support service for those students whose educational and/or social progress is adversely affected by communication difficulties.

Visiting Teacher Program

Teachers are assigned to teach students, at home or at student services, who are unable at a given time to get into an appropriate classroom facility in our district. The students may be on waiting lists for rehabilitative and behaviour disorder classes or have school phobias or other problems.

Post-Secondary Information

Each year, hundreds of Surrey high school students apply for scholarships and other forms of financial aid in order to pursue their interests and studies at the post-secondary level. Many of these students choose to expand their educational horizons by participating in a wide variety of specialized programs, ranging from student exchanges and youth conferences to work-study programs. Others invest time, energy and expertise in preparing for contests and competitions designed specifically for the benefit of secondary students. Information on financial opportunities can be accessed from a variety of sources. Earl Marriott's counselling staff, scholarship coordinator, and scholarship committee will circulate information throughout the year on scholarship opportunities, and preparing for contests and competitions designed specifically for the benefit of secondary students. Information on financial opportunities can be accessed from a variety of sources. Students should review the Ministry of Education publication entitled Financial Opportunities for Students to gain a broad perspective of existing scholarship and contest possibilities. The following information highlights a few of the many scholarship opportunities that are available.

Ministry District Authority Awards

To be eligible for a \$1,250 scholarship, a student must:

- Be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident (landed immigrant)
- Demonstrate superior achievement in any of the following areas.
- Fine Arts (Visual Arts, Dance, Drama, Music)
- Applied Skills (Business Ed., Technology Ed, Home Economics
- Physical Activity (not limited to Physical Education)
- Second Languages (Earl Marriott offers Spanish and French) *includes Aboriginal languages
- Community Service (volunteer activity)
- Technical & Trades Training (carpentry, automotive, cooking etc.)

<u>University Entrance Scholarships</u> (up to \$30,000)

Student apply directly to various post-secondary institutions for consideration based on their Grade Point Average and extra-curricular involvement in athletics, the arts, community service and student government.

School District and School Scholarships, Bursaries and Awards

Students are considered for a variety of school-based scholarships based largely on their Grade Point Average and extra-curricular involvement in athletics, the arts, student government and community service. In some cases, citizenship, humanitarianism, special needs and/or contribution to specific programs are an integral part of the scholarship and award.
