More Important Items

Students missing school and being late


It is very important that students come to school on time and consistently. Research is very clear that students who miss 10% or more of school in any given year can have increased learning challenges and gaps in their skills. So far, if your child has missed 7 or more days of school, they fall in that 10% category.

Being late also makes your child miss important settling in and readiness time. Most teachers begin the day with a check in and then move into important learning like reading, writing, and math. When your child is late, he or she misses important connection time, content and skill development.

Family vacations that take students out of their community provide many learning opportunities for students outside of the classroom and can be a valuable source of learning. While it is better that these happen during the break times, it is understandable that it cannot always be planned that way.

If you are struggling for any reason to get your child to school, please feel free to come and talk to me or your child's teacher. The learning done here at Clayton is tremendous and it is so important for each and every child to be here. We are very happy to help and provide support at any time and for any reason.

Please seriously consider how much school your child is attending. Students only learn by being present and ready for the day. Thank-you for your attention on this important matter and remember, we are here to help at any time.



Other reminders:

Unless you are just staying at the office, please remember to **sign in and wear a visitor badge** if you are going to be in the school for any reason, even for a few minutes. This is a safety measure for all our students.
