Dear Parents and Students of the North Surrey Learning Centre:

It has been a very busy September! Our student population continues to increase as students and parents hear about us. Our population is sitting around 200 students currently. Currently, our morning sessions are nearing capacity and there is limited space in our afternoon classes. At this time our Grade 10 Challenge Program is full as is our Outdoor Education Program.

A welcome back barbeque was held on Tuesday, October 1. Students were served hot dogs, hamburgers, chips, ice cream bars and pop. It was so delicious and we extend our thanks to Kay D. and Rochelle R (both youth workers in our school) for putting this together for us.

On Thursday, September 26, 2019, we recognized Orange shirt Day with the theme "Every Child Matters". Our Aboriginal Youth Worker, Rochelle R and our Indigenous Graduation Advocate, Lindsay M were instrumental in organizing a button making opportunity for our students and staff with our theme printed on each button.

On September 25, our Outdoor Program hosted an open house/parent meeting. Our next non-instructional day is on Thursday, October 24. There is no school on this day but there is Friday school for those with unexcused absences or for those wishing to complete extra work. Friday school runs from 8:30am to 11:30pm.

A reminder that Thanksgiving is right around the corner. Monday, October 14, 2019 is a holiday.

POLICY #7214 SMOKE FREE ENVIRONMENT

The Surrey Board of Education declares all School District No. 36 (Surrey) buildings, grounds and property (including school district vehicles), to be a totally smoke free environment for students, parents, visitors and staff.

In accordance with the *Tobacco and Vapour Products Control Act*, while in or on school property, all students, parents, visitors and staff are prohibited from:

- a) Smoking or using tobacco, or holding lighted tobacco, and;
- b) Using e-cigarettes, or holding activated e-cigarettes.

The prohibition in section a) above does not apply to the ceremonial use of tobacco in or on school property if the ceremonial use is approved by the board and is performed in relation to a traditional aboriginal cultural activity, or by a prescribed group for a prescribed purpose.

In accordance with the *Cannabis Control and Licensing Act* all students, parents, visitors and staff are prohibited from smoking cannabis, or holding lighted cannabis, in or on school property or within a prescribed distance from school property. As well, a person must not use or hold a device that is vapourizing cannabis for inhalation or release in the air in or on school property or within a prescribed distance from school property.

The school district shall post appropriate signage to inform students, staff, parents and other visitors of the Smoke Free Environment policy.

CAREER EDUCATION NEW S

After a busy September, career education is in full swing at the North Surrey Learning Centre. The Learning Centre offers many opportunities for students to further develop their employability skills and work toward graduation and employment.

Upcoming Programs:

ACE-IT: The Surrey School District in partnership with Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU), British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT), Vancouver Community College (VCC) and Surrey College offers students the opportunity to begin training in the trades while still in high school. Seats are limited and students must undergo a successful application and interview process to secure a spot. Successful applicants who complete the program receive industry certification, or post-secondary course credits, in addition to high school course credit. Tuition is paid by the Surrey School District. Applications for these district partnership programs are due in the spring and most programs begin semester 2. Trade opportunities include: Auto Collision, Auto Refinishing, Automotive Service, Baking & Pastry Arts, Carpentry, Culinary, Drafting, Education Assistant, Electrical, Hairstylist, Heavy Mechanical, Horticulture, Metal Fabrication, Millwright, Painter, Piping, Roofing and Welding.

Programs Currently Running:

We currently have 1 student in the ACE-IT Baking program at Vancouver Community College. When finished in January, Angelina will have earned 7 high school courses and completed the initial requirements towards her Red Seal in Baking and Pastry Arts.

Michael will begin the Welding program at KPU second semester. Michael will earn 6 high school course credits as well as training for the first steps in the Red Seal Welding program.

Certificate Workshops: Coming up in the next few weeks, students will have the opportunity to participate in a variety of workshops to learn valuable skills and earn certificates to enhance their resumes and help with future employment. Certificates currently scheduled are:

- Counterbalance Forklift
- Power Pallet
- Emergency First Aid
- FoodSafe

City of Surrey: Applications for the City of Surrey Mentorship Program are currently being accepted. Successful applicants will have the opportunity to earn work experience credits by completing a 3 week job placement at the City of Surrey. Past departments who have mentored students include: Parks Operations, Engineering Roads & Drainage, Recreation, Finance and others. It is a great opportunity for students to learn valuable job skills and earn course credit. **Pre-Placement:** A number of students participated in the 2 day pre-placement workshop. These students have completed the first steps towards their work experience 12 credits and are now ready to complete their 100 hours of work experience.

The government also offers a number of job skill training programs which include a work portion. Students who are interested in any of the programs should see the career facilitator for more information.

We encourage students to listen to Monday morning announcements and to check the Career News Board for volunteer positions, job fairs, and work information

SCHOOL FEES



North Surrey Learning Centre charges a \$15 Student Activity Fee and a \$25 refundable book deposit payable upon registration.

Student Activity Fee:

This fee covers the cost of go cards, year end, student activities and athletics, student certifications such as WorldHost, CPR, Foodsafe, etc., guest speakers, recognition and celebrations.

Refundable Book Deposit:

A \$25 deposit is collected from all students for the use of various textbooks and novels. This deposit is refunded, in its' entirety, to students who return all of their books upon withdrawal or graduation. If a student loses a book, the cost is deducted and a partial refund will be issued.

Other Fees:

Accounting workbooks can be purchased for cost and retained, or can be borrowed and returned in the original condition.

Calculators are available to borrow or purchase at cost.

Fine Arts supplies are available to purchase at cost, or can be purchased by the student at the vendor of choice.

Field Trips, Outings and Training (Superhost, Foodsafe, CPR). These options are available to all students at a subsidized cost, and are not a required component of courses for graduation.
