Aboriginal Learning is excited to announce we are returning to outdoor field studies with The Windspeaker program! Windspeaker is open to Aboriginal students in grades 8-12, and is intended to provide opportunities for leadership and networking among Indigenous students, as

well as offering both cultural and land-based activities that support and foster Aboriginal identity. Those in grades 10, 11 & 12 are able to get IDS credit on their school transcript for their work in Windspeaker. (The credits come in 2, 3 & 4 credit increments depending on how many field studies they attend and how many media journal entries they complete.)

The Windspeaker program is proven to be very popular amongst participants and is provided at no cost to students. Truth and Reconciliation Week

Be sure your Gr. 5 to 12 teachers sign up for Canada's 2021 Truth and Reconciliation Week, running Sept. 27 to Oct. 1, 2021. Over the course of five days, teachers will share videos created by Indigenous storytellers, which show traditional ceremonies and artistic performances, alongside conversations with Elders and knowledge keepers, survivors, and children of survivors of residential schools. There will also be a moving tribute to the missing children that never returned home from the residential schools. On September 30, Orange Shirt Day, a special program will be held to commemorate the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. This one-day workshop will provide a greater understanding of coaching through an Aboriginal lens, and is designed to motivate, inspire, and lead Aboriginal people in sport, recreation, and physical activity. It's an awesome opportunity for any Indigenous youth to receive some free coaching training (and looks great on a resume!).
