## Descriptors for Wheelchair Basketball

**Student athlete must meet the descriptors to be eligible**

<b>Sport Organization</b>	BC Wheelchair Sports Association BC Wheelchair Basketball Society	Instructors: various	
<b>General</b>	Athlete must have a physical disability	Athlete can have an intellectual disability, yet is high functioning	Student athlete can understand instruction and exercise good behaviour control
<b>Attendants</b>	<p>If athletes require <b>specialized assistance</b> with transfers they are required to provide attendant to do so <u>if they wish</u> to transfer into wheelchairs provided</p> <p>Common sense rule: If the student requires an attendant, please provide one Our volunteers are Leadership students and not trained attendants</p>		
<b>Transfers</b>	If a parent/guardian does not provide an attendant and has not indicated otherwise, we will assume we have permission to transfer your child		
<b>Eligibility</b>	Disability range includes: Amputees, Orthopedic Injuries, Spinal Cord Injuries, Spina Bifida and Cerebral Palsy	Practices will focus on skills, fun games, and friendly competition	
<b>Upper Extremities</b>	Athlete must have upper body strength and ability to <b>independently</b> control a <b>manual wheelchair</b>	<p>Student can maneuver a wheelchair</p> <p>Student can grip a basketball</p>	
<b>Lower Extremities</b>	The student athlete has an impairment of permanent nature in the lower part of the body which makes standing basketball impossible		
<b>Safety</b>	Student athlete must be able to understand and exercise safety precautions		
<b>AIM Games</b>	Student athletes attending <b>Wheelchair Multi-Sport</b> (basketball & tennis) practices are <b>eligible</b> for the <b>Wheelchair Skills Competition</b> at the <b>AIM Games</b> which takes place in May
